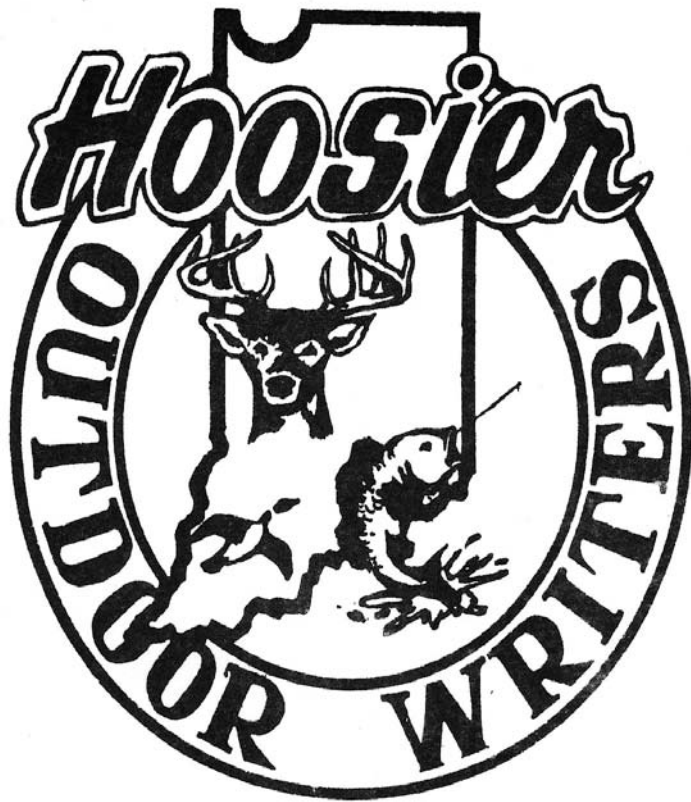

HOW Conference Another Resounding Success

The 2009 annual conference is now in the record books. It was actually a historic event, in the sense that it was the 40th meeting of the Hoosier Outdoor Writers! Nearly 50 HOW members and their guests gathered at Fort Harrison state park on the east side of Indianapolis on Saturday, February 21st to socialize, meet new people, renew old friendships, and learn more about the great outdoors.

We decided to do things a little differently this year, and we scheduled the HOW business meeting for after lunch. That gave us time to have a relaxing social hour from 8:00-9:00am, where members had a chance to drink coffee, eat breakfast and talk amongst themselves before the structured sessions began. It seemed to work out pretty well, too.



The first seminar speaker was Mark Reiter from the Indiana DNR. He gave a very interesting presentation on black powder cartridge guns, and he brought some of the rifles that he uses in competition shooting to show the membership. He uses



some of those rifles to make long-range 1000 yard shots! Like most hobbies, Reiter admitted that shooting black powder cartridge guns can easily become addictive, and it isn't an inexpensive sport, either. HOW member Dean Shadley quickly raised his hand and attested to that! In fact, the ammunition is so expensive that black powder cartridge shooters are basically forced to make and reload their own ammunition to be able to afford to shoot their guns as often as they would like!

The second seminar speaker was bowhunting and archery expert Gene Hopkins. Hopkins has been involved with the archery industry and bowhunting for decades, and he has one of the most extensive collections of archery equipment anywhere in the world.

He brought several different types and styles of bows from his personal collection and discussed the history and uses of each. He also explained the evolution of bows from ancient times to our modern compound bows. Even so, he admitted that he truly loves the traditional bows that were used for centuries before the advent of today's compound bows.



Hopkins is a life-long bowhunter, but he has been quite involved in many aspects of the archery and hunting fields. He has been involved with the Indiana Bowhunter's Association, the National Bowhunter Education Foundation and the Archery Hall of Fame.

Our third speaker was John Goss from the Indiana Wildlife Federation. John was kind enough to speak at the last minute when one of our other seminar speakers could not make it.

His discussion focused on the fact that America's hunters and anglers were the first true conservationists. This is just as true today as it was in years past. He then gave a short slide presentation and encouraged all HOW members to get involved with conservation issues and promote them to their readers, viewers and listeners.



At noon, the membership broke for an excellent lunch at the Garrison. This year's luncheon was generously co-sponsored by B'n'M Poles and Duke Energy, and it was enjoyed by all.

After lunch, the general membership meeting was called to order and HOW Nominating Chairman John Martino presented the new slate of officers and directors for 2009. Outgoing President Brent Wheat will be the Chairman of the Board, while Bryan Poynter will take over as President. John Maxwell will be the new Vice President, and Berg will remain as the Secretary/Treasurer. It was also announced that there would be a vote among the Board of Directors after the conference concerning hiring Berg as the new Executive Director. Incoming board members included Mike Schoonveld, Jeff Hammond, Dave Hoffman, Ben Shadley and Eric Stallsmith. Thank you to everyone who volunteered.

Brent Wheat and Tom Berg then announced and distributed the Excellence-In-Craft awards for 2009. Besides writing, photography and broadcast awards, this year there was also a Best Book contest. The contest was sponsored by Houghton-Mifflin-Harcourt, and it was a very close competition. Check the results in the next few pages to see who won.



The final activity of the day was the annual HOW Raffle. Raffle chairman Tom Berg and his helpers secured a record number of raffle donors this year – 58 companies in all! HOW Lake Michigan Outing

Dear HOW members,

If you had a chance to read some of my email notes earlier this month and late last month, you know that we are currently working on putting together a Lake Michigan outing for May 8th and May 9th. This trip is open to all Active members who are interested in heading north to the big lake. It won't be quite like other outings that we have had in the past, however. This one will give our members a chance to get on a boat and do some salmon fishing one afternoon (there's a great story opportunity right there), and then the next day get on another boat and cover a second story on a fishing outing for disadvantaged children (more story prospects!).

We will be working with Indiana's North Coast Charter Association on this outing, since they will be hosting a group of disadvantaged children (chronically ill, handicapped, etc) for a day of fishing on Lake Michigan. The captains are planning to put only 1 or 2 kids on each boat to make sure that they catch lots of fish, so there is room for members of the working press to be on the boat and cover the story.

The main event with the children will be held on Saturday, May 9th. HOW members who are planning to do some fishing of their own should arrive shortly before noon on Friday. We will meet at Pastrick Marina in East Chicago, which is easily reached via Cline Avenue (off of I80/94).

After fishing on Friday afternoon, we will spend the night, and then get on a boat with the kids Saturday morning. The salmon fishing has been spectacular for the past couple of weeks, so hopefully the fish will stick around and give the kids a thrill!

We are also working with the South Shore Convention & Visitors Authority (formerly the Lake County CVB), and they have arranged rooms for Friday evening for those HOW members that elect to come to cover the event. The final details are still being worked out, so we will provide the particulars to everyone who is attending in the next few days.

Although we are planning for there to be minimal cost for members to attend, we are borrowing one of OWAA's practices concerning trips like this. There will be no registration fee, but we will require a check for \$25 from each member to be used as earnest money (payable to HOW). If you show up, we will destroy the check. If you don't show up for some reason (you changed your mind, your dog had puppies, you forgot, etc), then we'll cash the check and give the money to the participating captains. After all, they are donating their time and gasoline for this outing.

As mentioned in the emails, the last day to sign up for the outing is April 30th. So hurry up! Maps to Pastrick Marina will be provided to anyone who needs one. We hope to see you there!

April 18, 1924 – March 15, 2009

Clay City – Courtney Dale Griffith, 84, of Lewis, Indiana, died March 15, 2009 in his home, surrounded by his family. He was born April 18, 1924 in Clay County, the son of Courtney Lee Griffith and Lillian Mae Field Griffith. He graduated from Coalmont High School. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. On October 18, 1947, he married Patricia Ann Oare Griffith. Dale was born, raised and stayed on the family farm. He worked on the family farm, and also farmed for other families. After retiring from farming, he worked at Shakamak state park at the boat rental. He worked there for 10 years. He also served as a county commissioner from 1962 to 1967.

Dale's memberships included Vigo Lodge 29 Free & Accepted Masons, Scottish Rite Valley of Terre Haute, both for more than 50 years. He was a life member of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 6606 in Clay City, American Legion Post 2, and the Elks Lodge in Brazil.

Dale was also an avid outdoorsman, enjoying fishing and quail hunting for many years. For several years, the family vacation was spent on a two-week fishing trip that all enjoyed. He was an inactive member of the Hoosier Outdoor Writers.

Survivors include his wife of 62 years, Pat Griffith; one son and daughter-in-law, Jeffrey Dale Griffith and Martha Griffith of Jasonville; one daughter, Tami Griffith Wonders of Lewis; four grandchildren, Nicole Walters (Travis), Kourtney Morris (Doug), Haven Wonders, and Jeffrey Tate Griffith; two great-grandchildren, Jake Walters and Hannah Walters; one sister, Jacky Brady of Tampa, Fla.; one brother, Gary "Pud" Griffith (Shelby) of Lewis; several nieces, nephews and extended family. He was preceded in death by his parents.

Graveside services will be held Wednesday at noon at Sanders Cemetery, near Lewis. Masonic services will be conducted by Lodge 29. Pastor Mark Messmer will provide funeral services; also VFW Post 6606 will provide military honors.

TO FISH AND HUNT IN ONTARIO, CANADA**

HOW members planning to travel to Canada this year should take note of a new fishing and hunting requirement:

Effective January 1, 2009, all anglers and hunters from outside Ontario who want to hunt and fish in the province will need to obtain an Outdoors Card. The card will be required in order to purchase an Ontario fishing or hunting license, except for a one-day fishing license.

The introduction of a nonresident Outdoors Card is part of the modernization of Ontario's licensing system. Initially, nonresident anglers and hunters will be able to purchase the Outdoors Card by filling out an application at any Service Ontario counter or Ontario fishing and hunting license issuer. There are over 1,800 license issuers located across the province. The paper application serves as a temporary Outdoors Card until the permanent card is received in the mail.

The Outdoors Card is a wallet sized plastic card valid for three years. The cost of the three year card is \$9.00 Canadian. There are two types of Outdoors Card: the Fishing Outdoors Card which can only be used with fishing licenses, and the Hunting/Fishing Outdoors Card which valid for both hunting and fishing. Ontario residents have required Outdoors Cards to purchase hunting and fishing licenses since 1993.

A fully integrated automated licensing system is scheduled to be implemented in 2010. The automated system requires all anglers and hunters to have a unique identification number. To meet this requirement, the ministry is extending the obligation to have an Outdoors Card to nonresident anglers and hunters. With the Outdoors Card, nonresidents will be able to purchase Ontario fishing and some hunting licenses from home, either by using the ministry's website or the toll free automated telephone service. These options will not be available until closer to the implementation date.

Membership Requirements

Membership is open to anyone who meets one of the following:

1. Active

Members are those regularly engaged in the paid dissemination of outdoor-oriented information via newspapers, radio, television, magazines, trade journals, books, photographs, art, lectures, or other fitting media. (Basic guidelines of "regularity" of dissemination are: 20 newspaper articles, photos or broadcasts a year; two national or four regional



magazines or specialty journal articles a year, or one book, 10 lectures, or 20 bona fide outdoor news releases a year.)

The legal advisor for the association shall be an active member without meeting the basic guidelines.

2. Associate

Members are those who have a strong direct interest in the outdoors, either professional or personal, such as conservationists of all kinds; public employees in outdoor fields; educators teaching related subjects; certain sportsmen and retail-level dealers in outdoor goods, equipment or facilities.

3. Supporting

Members are those engaged in major commercial efforts directly related to the outdoors, such as manufacturers, distributors, manufacturers' representatives, or advertising agencies serving any of these.

4. Active Student

Members are those between the ages of 18 and 24 years who are bona fide college students with a major in journalism, communications, or natural resources sciences.

5. Associate Student

Members are those who are students who have an active interest in the outdoors in the areas of hunting, fishing, ecology, or in preserving the environment in general.
